Fredericksburg, Texas Reunion December 2009

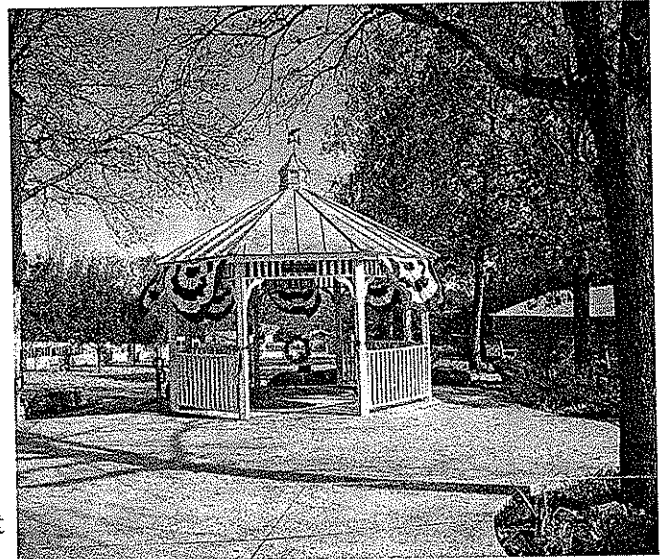

Reunion Timeline

Sunday Dec. 6th: Group was joined by Author John Wukovits who is working on a book about the DE413 as we speak. We gathered in the lobby and boarded the van for the trip up to Fredericksburg. Bob and Billie LeClercq and their friends R.C. and Norma Williams joined us at PoPo's Restaurant for an early lunch. Bob boasted that PoPo's had the best fried chicken in Texas. After lunch, everyone agreed!

Upon our arrival in Fredericksburg, we proceeded to the Nimitz Museum for the WWII Submarine Memorial Dedication Ceremony in memory of RADM Charles D. Grojean, USN. Admiral Grojean was the Executive Director of the Nimitz Museum and a dear friend of the Samuel B. Roberts Association for many years.

Sunday evening we enjoyed dinner at Mamacita's Restaurant. Great evening...great food with a surprise birthday cake for Glenn Huffman who turned 84 (or was that 48?). Tuesday Dec. 8th: Tour of the LBJ Ranch and lunch at the Wildseed Farm. Delightful day!

On Wednesday December 4th at 2p.m. we held our Business Meeting in the Hospitality room at The Inn on Baron's Creek. First order of business was the election/appointment of a new Board of Directors. The members are Mel Harden (Survivor) , Bill Wilson(Survivor), Sam Stewart, Patti Hedgeman and John Walsh, all children of Survivors.

Bronze Plaque

The Bronze Plaque was originally going to be placed over the existing Taffy 3 Memorial at Fort Rosecrans in San Diego. Permission was denied and the plaque will now be placed in the Samuel B. Roberts Pavilion at the Nimitz Museum in Fredericksburg, Texas. It was agreed that the Association will pay for shipping of the plaque from San Diego to Fredericksburg plus reimburse the Museum for the cost of installation.

Memorial Walkway

It was also agreed upon to install a concrete/brick walkway connecting the SBR Pavilion to the Memorial Walkway. The cost of this will be \$1,500 to be paid by the SBR Survivors Association.

Note: This may be a great time for family members to honor Shipmates with a Commemorative Brick placed in the Memorial Walkway adjacent to the Samuel B. Roberts Pavilion. Individual bricks cost \$100. Forms are available through the Museum

Another Note: A most generous donation in the amount of \$1,500 was received courtesy of Mel and Leona Harden with a note saying:"to be used pay for the walkway leading to the Pavilion" Thank you Mel and Leona!

Just one more!: speaking of Leona Harden: Leona spent a week in the hospital with Congestive Heart Failure after the Texas reunion. All of that walking and getting in and out of taxi cabs definitely takes a toll! Take care, Leona and we hope you are feeling better!

A Note from Tom Stevenson

We received the following story from Tom Stevenson entitled: Roberts 1st Voyage

We took delivery of the vessel from Brown Brothers shipyard on the Houston Ship Canal. All the shipyard workers and the distinguished guests were gathered on the end of the pier as the ship began to back into the main canal. Captain Copeland had always worked with diesel powered vessels and he did not realize that the reversing of a turbine driven ship required much more work and time than a diesel which is like a car. He gave the order to back full speed and the vessel did so. I was the officer of the deck and I told the Capt. that we were approaching shore very fast. The shore was a marsh land full of cows grazing. He gave the order to reverse and full ahead. Before the propellers could bite we were up in the marshland among the cows who were stampeding. Then the propellers began to bite and we headed full speed towards the dock and all the workers and guests panicked and ran full speed to get off the dock. Finally after two more back and forths we straightened out and with a blast of the horn and a sigh of relief we began our 50 mile voyage to Galveston. We arrived without further incident.

Thank you to Bob LeClercq for coordinating every last detail of our Texas Reunion.

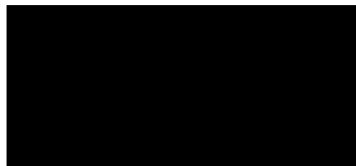
Bud Comet was joined by son J.C. and daughter Jamie at the reunion. Now that we have met all of your kids, Bud, we are really going to be able to keep track of you!
