
Bronze Plaque Has a New Home

It is with great relief that we report that the plaque which was originally intended for Fort Rosecrans Cemetery at Point Loma in San Diego is now safe and sound in Fredericksburg, Texas at the Nimitz Museum. If you remember, the monument at Fort Rosecrans bearing the names of all those who perished during the battle had eroded with time and effects of the elements. Our DE 413 Association proceeded (with the blessing and encouragement of the "powers that be" at Fort Rosecrans) to commission a bronze plaque to be placed over the names. After much debate, Fort Rosecrans withdrew their permission and we were left with a bronze plaque that deserved to be displayed in a place of honor. With the help of Mr. Bob LeClerc and the wonderful staff of the Nimitz Museum in Fredericksburg, Texas, said plaque will be placed near the Samuel B. Roberts Pavilion in the courtyard of the museum. We had discussed having the plaque installed in the ceiling of the Pavilion, however once the architect evaluated the structure, it was decided that near the Memorial Walkway was a much better option.

There have been many costs associated with transporting and installing the plaque, and much of it has been generously donated by Bob and Billie LeClerc. In fact, the total cost of the construction of the limestone mounting base for the plaque was \$3,861.79 of which Bob LeClerc paid \$1,861.79 not to mention the countless trips that Bob made up to Fredericksburg to make sure that everything was in order. This organization will be ever grateful for all that the LeClercs have contributed.

The picture at right was taken from inside the pavilion. When it is complete, there will be a header plaque that says: "This will be a fight against overwhelming odds. We will do what damage we can." These words were spoken by Lt.Cdr. Robert Copeland to the crew of the U.S.S. SAMUEL B. ROBERTS (DE-413), October 25, 1944, Leyte Gulf, Phillipine Islands.

The ROBERTS sank that day. The names below gave their lives.



Ahoy John and Susan Walsh,

Great to know that you are taking over the Newsletter. Sorry to hear about Dick Rohde's death. I met Dick at your San Diego reunion many moons ago. I wanted to thank him and the crew of the Roberts for helping save our fanny at the Leyte Gulf invasion.

On the day the DE413 was sunk I was on one of the support ships at the Leyte invasion, the USS TEAK AN-35. The enemy had two large Task forces coming in on us from both directions. Their intention was to sink as many support ships as they could. Due to the Samuel Roberts and other great ships, plus our airplanes, they turned the enemy around before they could reach us.

My ship survived the war and returned home early 1946, thanks to the Samuel Roberts and other great ships and planes.
