



BUSINESS MEETING

Notes on the SBRSA Meeting, Buffalo, 12 Oct. 2005

Our meeting in our Hospitality room in the Downtown Holiday Inn was opened at 10:15 a.m. with Dudley Moylan presiding and seven regular members present.

Notes on the meeting on October 25, 2004 in San Diego were read.

Mel Harden, Co-Treasurer presented the financial report showing income of \$4,680.15 primarily from Dues and Reunion advances, and expenses of \$621.13, giving a total of \$8,850.68 with reunion expenses still to be paid.

Dick Rohde then presented a report on our monuments in the Ft. Rosecrans cemetery. Apparently the lettering is fading and other ships have already started repairs, but we did not decide to do anything at this time. No information was available on possible costs.

There was discussion of the disposition of our treasury if we are disbanded. At the suggestion of the chairman an addition to the By-Laws, which must be approved by two-thirds of actual members voting, was proposed as follows.

"If at a time of actual or imminent dissolution of the Association and there are no regular active members available and more than \$100 in the Treasury after legitimate debts have been resolved, a committee consisting of Patti Hedgeman, John Walsh and Cliff Rohde (or possible substitutes) shall determine the disposition of the remaining amount in accordance with our general purposes."


No solution was reached regarding our archives.

The current board members and officers were reelected with Bill Wilson to replace deceased board member Don Young.

BYLAWS OF THE SAMUEL B. ROBERTS SURVIVORS ASSOCIATION

(As amended November 2005)

The Samuel B. Roberts Survivors Association is organized to further the remembrance of the exploits in battle of the *USS Samuel B. Roberts (DE 413)* and of the men who served aboard her and to provide a means of fellowship for those men.

The full voting members of the Association are those who served aboard the *Samuel B. Roberts* on October 25, 1944. There are also associate members consisting of other shipmates, family members, and friends subscribing to our purposes.

The officers are the president, vice president, and secretary-treasurer, and four additional directors, any of whom may be assigned specific duties. The officers and directors are elected at ship's reunion, after candidate recommendations are made by a nominating committee appointed by the president, and will take office upon election. If the time between reunions exceeds two years a mail balloting should be provided. The vice president automatically succeeds an incapacitated president for the remainder of the term, though there is no automatic succession between terms. If one is needed the directors will select a new vice president, and they will also fill any other vacancies of officers and directors.

Between reunions the board will consult and make all decisions relevant to carrying forth our purposes, and only if occasion demands an action that would preclude such full consultation, the decisions may be made by an executive committee of at least three of the board, selected in advance by the board. No officer, director or member may commit the Association to any plan, design, or activity touching upon gifts, remembrances, or reunion features unless specifically authorized in advance to make such a decision and within a prescribed financial limit.

Dues and special assessments will be determined by a vote of the members. A majority vote will prevail, except for bylaw amendments when a two-thirds vote of those voting is necessary. Bylaw amendments should be submitted to the membership at least twenty days before the reunion meeting or mail balloting.

If at a time of actual or imminent dissolution of the Association and there are no regular active members available and more than one hundred dollars in the Treasury after legitimate debts have been resolved, a committee consisting of Patti Hedgeman, John Walsh and Cliff Rohde (or possible substitutes) shall determine the disposition of the remaining amount in accordance with our general purposes.
