- 1. The minutes of last years meeting were read.
- 2. The following actions by the Board during the past year were reviewed.
 - a. The proposal for disposition of our treasury, should the Association disband was approved.
 - b. The decision to go ahead and solicit donations for the placing of bronze plaques on the monument at Fort Rosecrans was approved.
- 3. Dick Rohde reported on the collection of moneys to pay for our portion of the expense of installing bronze plaques on the monument. Our share was \$7,225 which has been received and is in a separate account. He reported that the Johnston Hoel Association would rather paint the letters instead of installing plaques. Bob LeClercq was authorized to write a letter encouraging them to go for the bronze plaques per the John Ibe plan, as the other ships have done.
- 4. With the death of Vince Goodrich, the position of Co-Treasurer is vacant. Dick Rohde was appointed to fill the vacancy.
- 5. John Walsh was appointed Director.
- 6. Sam Stewart offered to plan the next two reunions and suggested that Washington D.C. be the site for next year. There was complete agreement to proceed as outlined above.

Wednesday evening signaled the time for our closing banquet and the realization that our time in Jacksonville was nearing an end.

Following a social hour and excellent dinner prepared and served beautifully by the hotel staff we were privileged to have as our speaker, CDR Michael L. 

Books and TV

"No Higher Honor" is the story of the USS SAMUEL B. ROBERTS, FFG 58, highlighting the striking of the Iranian mine in the Persian Gulf in 1988. Author Brad Penniston allows us to follow the ship from before the launching in December 1984 Bath, Maine to the Gulf, to its return to active duty. We learn about the crew and its Captain and how the months and months of damage control training paid off. It is hard to put down once you start reading. I recommend it to you highly.

"Sea of Thunder", written by Evan Thomas is another story of the Battle of Leyte Gulf told through the viewpoint of four commanders who are familiar to all of us. They are Admiral William Halsey, Admiral Takeo Kurita, Commander Ernest Evans, CO of USS JOHNSTON, and Admiral Matome Ugaki, the last kamikaze whose plane plunged into the sea. Although I have not yet read this book, after all of the words of praise I have received, it is #1 on my list.

"Death of the Japanese Navy" is the title of a new documentary on The Battle Off Samar to be presented by The History Channel on December 15th at 10:00 p.m. EST. This part of their "Dogfight" series will use computer generated images of all the ships on both sides. Jim Hornfischer says "It is sure to be a striking and dramatic recreation of the mayhem of October 25, 1944." Jim and veterans of the battle were interviewed for the show. Mark it on your calendars.
